A good referee report not only clearly states the shortcomings of the work, but also lays out detailed – and realistic – suggestions for improvement.

(3) One research proposal, 7-8 pages double-spaced (15 percent):

(4) Final exam (30 percent): The final will be offered during the final lecture period ($\underline{\text{on } 5/8}$).
